The festivities this year of the High Holidays felt very poignant in highlighting, on one hand, the personal gratitude of the blessings I have in my life, and yet, also the

suffering of so many in our world. The personal and universal have never felt so interlinked and relevant. And as I will describe on Yom Kippur, we feel how temporal and fragile our world is at the moment, where we often feel like strangers in our own land, and witness happenings and changes in public opinion that feel 'alien' to the culture we all grew up in. The festival of Sukkot, this year, may feel especially significant as it mandates us religiously to welcome 'the stranger' in our midst and create a welcoming environment in our communal and personal Sukkah and space.


During the ancient Temple days, it was customary to sacrifice seventy bulls symbolizing the 'seventy nations of the world'. In these seven days of the holiday preceding *Shemini Atzeret* and *Simchat Torah*, we reconnect with nature and 'being outside', returning us to the unformed cosmos of life. Being part of nature is universal to all humankind and to what preceded the divisions of people into faiths and nations.

Sukkot highlights for us as Jews, that even though we have our own uniqueness, we must never forget that we are part of humanity. Just like we were strangers in a strange land in Egypt, and in fact for more than two thousand years of exile, no matter how settled we feel and 'at home', we must always embrace those who don't feel as we do. We must never become smug in the comfort of our 'castles'. Our tradition on Sukkot, as on Shabbat, and in our seders, is to welcome those not from our tribe to join us in breaking bread together. Sukkot is also the time when we must raise awareness for those without a home or shelter, and so this year our amazing CBENT youth will be sleeping one night during Sukkot at the synagogue. We ask you TO SPONSOR THEM so we can raise funds for organizations that care for those without a home as part of our Tikkun Olam education. In a country that has so much wealth, it is obscene that there are those who are hungry and lack adequate shelter and a roof over their heads. In our daily evening prayers, we thank G-d for our 'Sukkat Shalom' in the Hashkiveinu prayer; acknowledging and requesting that we be protected. As Rabbi Dalia Marx wisely says, the sukkah we build in Sukkot is "not a tough resistant fortress that symbolizes divine protection in our tradition, nor a well-guarded, isolated bastion. Instead, it is a frail and temporary sukkah which is the place of beneficent protection. If only there could be peace both inside and outside our homes..." At this special time, let's think and reach out to all sectors in our diverse population whose homes are 'at risk', be they migrants, foreign workers, domestic violence victims, war veterans, and those who live under the poverty line.

Here is a special blessing we can say:

We bless the Divine Presence, whose wings shelter us with peace. Redeemer of Israel who brought us out of Egypt, on this festival Of Sukkot.

Our thoughts turn to those who dwell in fear and danger in their own homes. With compassion and an outstretched arm, bring them forth into freedom, And shelter them in Your Sukkah of peace.

The month of *Tishrei*, the seventh month of the Jewish calendar, is the Sabbath of the months, just as Shabbat is the Sabbath of the week. As Shabbat allows us to rest and rejuvenate our souls from the work of the past week, so do the holidays of *Tishrei*


enable us to reflect and rejoice about our accomplishments of the past year. As Shabbat renews our spirit for the coming week, so do the festivals of *Tishrei* renew our spirits with increasing joy as we approach the new spiritual year.

Many Jews move towards the High Holiday season with trepidation, believing that Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are days of awe and self-denial, with memories of the year's sins and failures on their minds. However, if we approach *Tishrei* as the Sabbath month, we can see that this month helps us reflect on our successes of the past year as well. We have survived and grown spiritually despite the many temptations that may have come our way. Even though we were not perfect (read the *Al Chet* carefully in your *Machzor*), we did improve. The month of *Tishrei* will launch us towards an even better new year.

The liturgy and music for these holidays show this to be true. Rosh Hashanah is a joyous event, a renewal of our covenant with the Almighty. The blast of the Shofar is a reminder that our God, our King, remembers us, cares for us, and rewards us. Yom Kippur is actually also very upbeat as is seen by taking a closer look at the prayers, even during *Yizkor*. The *Shiviti* prayer says, "I have set the Lord always before me, surely G-d is at my right hand; I shall not fail. Therefore, my heart and soul rejoice..."

The holidays of Sukkot and Simchat Torah must also be celebrated to experience the full power of *Tishrei*. The joyful songs of the *Hallel*, the parading of the *Lulav and Etrog* to ancient marching tunes, and the singing and dancing with the Torah, all culminate in a glorious finale to a spiritually uplifting month. Complete your new approach to this holy month of *Tishrei*, so that we can derive new and delightful meanings to our holiest month together, and together we will truthfully be able to say *Chag Same'ach* – Have a joyous holiday. *G'mar Chatima Tova*, have a great finish to the month of *Tishrei!*

Spotlight: Volunteers and Community Support



Mensch Making Academy & Mini Mensch Academy Ellen Glassman, Education Director

Congregants, parents and kids! Bring your pets - dogs, cats, birds, rabbits, fish, turtles - stuffed animals are equally as important to bring too, for Rabbi Michal and Cantor Steve to bless on Sunday, October 26, at 9 am! While the "Blessing of the Animals" is not a traditional Jewish ritual, many modern congregations like ours hold

ceremonies, often around the reading of *Parshat Noach*, to celebrate the relationship between humans and animals. These events highlight Judaism's deep ethical commitments to animal welfare.

Parshat Noach tells the story of the great flood and God's covenant with Noah and the animals. It establishes several key Jewish ethical principles concerning the animal world:

- A sacred partnership: G-d's covenant after the flood was not just with Noah and his descendants, but with "all living creatures". By saving the animals, G-d affirmed their value and importance in creation, establishing an enduring partnership between humanity, the animal kingdom, and G-d.
- Human responsibility: Noah and his family spent a year on the ark caring for the animals, feeding them according to their needs at the proper time. This act of tireless devotion serves as an example of human responsibility for the welfare of animals.
- The prohibition of cruelty: Following the flood, humanity is given permission to eat meat, but with strict conditions. One of the Seven Laws of Noah forbids eating a limb torn from a living animal (Genesis 9:4), codifying a prohibition against extreme cruelty. This principle laid the foundation for the later, more extensive laws found in the Torah that protect animals from suffering.

 Our Mensch Making Academy's Blessing of the Animals helps students:
- foster gratitude and compassion it reminds us to appreciate the role that animals play in our lives, from cherished pets to the creatures in the wider ecosystem.
- reinforces the concept of the Jewish value known as *tza'ar ba'alei chayim*, or "the suffering of living creatures." This biblical and rabbinic principle prohibits causing unnecessary pain to animals.
- be the call to action for students and families to become more conscious of how they treat their animals.
- recognize that having a pet is a lifelong commitment.

To top off this day, we will be hosting a Petting Zoo from Quiver Farms from 10 am to 12 noon, complete with a calf, sheep, rabbits, a llama, ducks, and more! Stop by and pet our furry friends!!! I am looking forward to seeing you on Sunday, October 26!


Shanah Tovah U'Metukah – Wishing you a good and sweet new year!


